Tony Bentley joined Southend from Stoke in 1961 (in a deal that then enabled Stoke to re-sign Stanley Mathews!), and over the next decade Tony notched played 417 times which puts him fourth in our all-time appearances list.



During his time at the club Tony struck up a friendship with long-time fan Ray Sorrell, who has been supporting Southend since our days at the Kursaal back in the 1930's.

It was great to see them receive another great reception from the fans and Tony, who now lives in Novia Scotia, met up with many friends from his time at the club.

QUICKFIRE 5!

We plan to issue out requests from time to time asking you if you could respond to a set five questions which we will then include in a future Newsletter. Don't feel too relieved if you have not had an email from us yet, we will get to you at some stage

This time we are delighted to have **Julian Hails** taking time out to respond to our usual five questions. Over to you Julian

1. Who had the biggest influence on your playing career at Roots Hall and why?

Peter Taylor was the best coach I ever played for in my career and he was the main reason I signed for the club. When I left Fulham I had quite a lot of interest from clubs including some quite well known managers:- Neil Warnock (Huddersfield); Sam Allardyce (Blackpool); Dennis Smith (Oxford) all got in touch, but I loved Pete's training sessions and his coaching style so I chose Southend.

2. Who was the biggest character you played with and why did they stand out?

There were so many but one of the biggest is sadly no longer with us. Jeroen Boere perhaps wasn't everyone's 'cup of tea' but he had a huge influence within the dressing room. 'Yosser' just didn't care if his jokes upset people. For example, I remember him asking manager Ronnie Whelan if we could have a minute silence for Simon Royce's cat who had just died that morning. I roomed with him once and while I was having a long soak in the bath he shouted in that unmistakeable Dutch accent 'F***in hell Hailsy, you dissolved in that bath yet?' To have the confidence and intelligence to be able to 'take the mickey' in his second language was admirable. I really liked Yosser and was very sad to hear that he had passed away.

3. Who would you say was the best player you saw in a Southend shirt during your time at the club and what made them so special?

Hard to pick just one but I would have to say Ronnie Whelan as he was the complete midfield player; he read the game brilliantly, could mix it physically, but also had great vision and passing ability. Had he not got injured during my first season with the club I am sure we'd have done better, and Peter Taylor would have had much longer in the job. A close joint second would be Chris Powell, the best defender I ever played with, and Mike Marsh, incredible touch and ability on the ball.

4. Can you tell us any funny stories from your playing days either whilst at Southend or elsewhere?

We were playing Crystal Palace at home on a Sunday afternoon and it was shown live on ITV on 'The Big Match'. We were warming up about half hour before kick-off when George Graham, suited and booted, walked across the pitch to take his place in the commentary box alongside Brian Moore. In those days the TV pundits had to climb a very dodgy thin ladder to get to the TV gantry. We all looked over to see George try and negotiate the climb up and there were a few comments about him not having to do that at Old Trafford or Anfield. At this point, Paul Byrne got involved,

who as well as being a brilliant right winger, was also a bit mad. He decided to try and 'ping' a few 40 yarders at George as he was climbing the ladder to make his ascent even more tricky. As dangerous as it was, it was also very funny, and maybe it says a bit about Byrney's crossing ability that George made it to the top safely.

5. What did you do after hanging up your playing boots and do you ever get back to Roots Hall to see a game?

Although I did my FA coaching badges towards the end of my career I felt I needed a new challenge when I retired through injury, so I took a PGCE at University of Hertfordshire and became a secondary school teacher. This has been the ideal second career for me as I can combine my love of coaching sports like football and tennis with teaching maths, a subject I always enjoyed at school.
