Shortly before Dave too we had Dickie Dowsett sign up to SUEPA to become at age 87 our oldest member – Dickie made a scoring debut in the first ever match at Roots Hall in 1955.

Securing a signing for SUEPA often requires a bit of effort in following up leads - persistence is a good quality to have and the handful of our 'SUEPA Agents' who are helping us grow our membership base often need detective-like qualities. The signing at the end of October of mid-'60's winger Malcolm Slater is an interesting one

Malcolm talked at length and fondly about his time with Celtic and the Shrimpers but it was apparent that he had lost touch with the club, so Alistair took it upon himself to call Roots Hall. Alistair (and what a top guy he is) had no contact details but recalled where his son Alex worked, so with that information we searched him up, got his employer to pass a message across, and ended up having a great chat with Alex about his Dad and signed Malcolm up for SUEPA. Some great comments recalling Malcolm's time as a Shrimper came in on our Facebook page when (as we do with all new-joiners) we announced his signing which is lovely to see - hopefully some time we'll have the opportunity to invite Malcolm back to the club.

We are always on the lookout for new members – at Roots Hall in October we spotted Leo Roget who was visiting for the day and had popped on to the pitch to do the half-time draw. A quick dash by a SUEPA Agent as he disappeared back down the players tunnel secured his signing – apologies for the surprise Leo!

Overall, we now have 18 goalkeepers, 40 defenders, 59 midfielders, 39 strikers and five former coaching/backroom staff in the SUEPA squad (Dave Smith's assistant Mickey Buxton being another recent recruit in the last category).
