


MEMBERSHIP

WITH THE FANS



At our match day events we always let fans know who is coming and are very happy to facilitate a meet up. Back in January we were contacted by Shrimper fan Mike Schooley asking us if we could put him in touch with '60's SUFC sharpshooter Mike Beesley, saying that 'I used to caddy for him at Belfairs GC, back in 1969, when I was a strapping 12 year old'. We said we could do better than that as we had 'Beeso' lined up as one of our guests for the Bristol Rovers game!

Mike explains: "Mickey kind of took over the father role for me, by taking me to my first ever football match. It was a Wednesday night reserve match and the whole first team were there as they were expected to be. From that moment, I was hooked and my first first team match was the 1-3 home defeat to Grimsby in September '69. We stayed in touch for a long time. I bought my first full set of golf clubs from him when he was at HW Stone Sport & Leisure at Thames Drive. I also caddied for him at two Evening Echo Pro Ams at Boyce Hill."

Saturday 7 March was their first meet up for a couple of decades. A SUEPA re-union, lovely.

This time we are delighted to have Big Bad Barry Corr respond to our usual five questions.

Over to you Barry

1. Who had the biggest influence on your playing career at Roots Hall and why?

Paul Sturrock took me to Southend, he had a huge influence on my career and I would run through walls for him. Even now! Also, Ben Clarkson was a big influence, in my five years at Southend I made more appearances than I did at the rest of my clubs put together. He kept me on the pitch and is still my good friend.



2. Who was the biggest character you played with and why did they stand out?

Bilel Mohsni. I'm not sure I need to say why. One of the best players I've played with, and a really nice guy. But don't make him angry, you wouldn't like him when he's angry!

3. Who would you say was the best player you saw in a Southend shirt during your time at the club and what made them so special?

I'll go from our promotion season. Dan Bentley was and still is an exceptional GK. And in my opinion Ryan Leonard was our best and most important player that season.

4. Can you tell us any funny stories from your playing days either whilst at Southend or elsewhere?

There are many but as I'm sure you often get from players, lots I can't mention! Me and Luke Prosser swimming in the estuary with only our medals around our necks after the play-off win was quite funny.

5. What did you do after hanging up your playing boots and do you ever get back to Roots Hall to see a game?

I'm now coaching at Cambridge United having completed my coaching badges and finishing a degree in psychology. I have been back a couple of times and always look out for Southend's results.

THE SOUTHEND UNITED FC HALL OF FAME EVENING – ANOTHER UPDATE

Bobby is now out of hospital convalescing and we all wish him a speedy recovery.

WORKING WITH OTHER FORMER PLAYER GROUPS, AND NOW SUEPA LEADING THE WAY

We network with a number of former player groups of other clubs in doing what we do, often to exchange ideas and to seek mutual help in tracking down players. It can be quite enlightening seeing what other associations are up to, many of whom have been established for a decade or two, so we still feel like 'the new kids on the block' with a lot to learn. Certainly some are very 'structured', run by committees and holding huge events, whereas others are more 'home-spun'. We'll let you guess where we might sit!

What SUEPA has had though is a phenomenal start, and as far as we can tell our growing membership list puts us right up there in terms of reaching out. We continue to feel though that there is much more we can do. To some extent this depends upon our own resources (as a reminder we are part of the club supporters group The Shrimpers Trust), but also we do need to find ways of working with other associations to continue to share ideas and different ways of working.

To this end, and teaming up with the Blackpool FC Former Players Association, via Derek Spence we have written to the PFA seeking their views on introducing a network of ex player groups across all EFL clubs (and maybe beyond). Not all clubs have such a group, whereas others are perhaps less contactable than they might be. We strongly feel that there could be a lot to gain from having the PFA encourage and make more accessible groups like ours, indeed we seeing it dovetailing neatly with the PFA's own work with former footballers.

Of course, recent events regarding coronavirus are likely to mean that the PFA's attention is elsewhere at the moment, though in many ways in such times former player groups can help in reaching out to their members to perhaps make them more meaningful than ever.

We will keep you posted regarding any developments in this area.
