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WEMBLEY FACTS

We first played at Wembley on 6th December 1930, a match in Divison 3 South, against Clapton (later Leyton) Orient – who played two "home" games at Wembley due to emergency work being required at their then home. For the record, Blues won 3-0 and there were 1,916 in attendance! Of course, more recently, just two years ago, we played Crewe Alexandra in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy Final, which we lost 2-0.



The old Wembley stadium, also known as the Empire Stadium, with the iconic Twin Towers, was opened in 1923, with the first turf being cut by monarch of the time, King George V. It cost £750,000 and took exactly 300 days to build! The first football match to be played there was the FA Cup final between Bolton Wanderers and West Ham United on 28th April 1923. Wanderers won 2-0, with the 1st goal being scored by David Jack – who later went on to manage the Shrimpers, from 1934 to 1940. David, was also the son of Southend's 1st ever manager Bob Jack.

The last competitive league game at "Old" Wembley was the 2000 1st Division Play Off final between Ipswich Town and Barnsley, resulting in a 4-2 win for Ipswich. England's last game there was against Germany on 7th October 2000, with England losing 1-0, and the final goal at Wembley being scored by Dieter Hamann.

New Wembley, by comparison took 5 years to build, from 2002 to 2007 and cost £757 MILLION pounds! The first official match there involving professional players was on 24th March 2007, between England's and Italy's U21s. Italian striker, Giampaolo Pazzini scored the 1st goal after just 28 seconds and went on to score the stadium's 1st hat-trick.

The Stadium holds 2,618 toilets – more than ANY other venue in the world...hopefully none of us will be queuing for long then! Win or lose, there are an awful lot of steps to be climbed to the Royal Box – 107! They must be a lot easier to climb if you've won! The old Wembley had just 39 steps by comparison.



The 1st competitive club game and cup final was held on 12th May 2007, between Stevenage Borough and Kidderminster Harriers in the FA Trophy Final, which Stevenage won 3-2, with former Blue (and sadly no longer with us) Mitchell Cole scoring their first. The 1st penalty save and red card were both during the same match, between Exeter City and Morecambe Town in the Conference National Play Off Final on 20th May 2007. The penalty was saved by Paul Jones of Exeter, and the red card given for a



head butt by Exeter's Matthew Gill.

The 1st FA Cup Final to be played at the new stadium was between Chelsea and Manchester United on 19th May 2007. Chelsea won 1-0, thanks to a Didier Drogba goal.

England's 1st full International at Wembley was a friendly played against Brazil on 1 June 2007. England's captain, John Terry became the 1st England player to score in an International with his goal in the 68th minute. The match ended 1-1.

We'll be greeted by a friendly face when we arrive at Wembley, with the statue of former Southend manager, Bobby Moore gazing at us as we walk up Wembley Way – I'm sure someone will be adorning him with a Southend scarf at some point!
