Your committee got together on May 30 and again on June 13. The latter was chiefly for updating the latest moves on the Supporters Trust and, unfortunately, was the first committee meeting I have had to miss since being voted aboard. Sorry.

THE non-appearance of the plans for the new ground - FOUR different deadlines have been missed - is turning into the longest-running farce since Brian Rix was dropping his trousers nightly at the Whitehall Theatre. United's Boots and Laces project appears to have universal political backing, both local and national, so there is no shifting blame there. Paul Fitzgerald and Kirstine Nicholson have met with David Amess MP (Southend West) and SUSC president Sir Teddy Taylor MP (Southend East), who both give their full agreement. Sir Teddy suspects just 'a hitch'. Well, if that is so, what the hell is it? Paul is now trying to arrange further clarification meetings with John Main - though it appears we will all be getting the chance of a one-toone at his planned roadshows - and Ron Martin. John has said recently "If you are wondering what happens if we don't get the planning permission, quite simply we will have to pack up." But there will be no permission given for anything unless the plans come out of the woodwork! Paul will also be seeking the views of United's other directors, who seem to have been the mute side of quiet on the issue. Aren't they wondering what is happening? Or aren't they bothered at the prospect of becoming potentially the first Accrington Stanley of the 21st century? Martin Dawn plc made an investment in United which they were confident they would get back. If that situation should change, the plug could be pulled and 94 years of history go down the toilet. And if Southend did go bang, there would be no keeping a League place as Southend United 2001 or whatever. Current Nationwide League rules say you go bust, you go out - rescue package or not. We would be another Aldershot saying hello to the Rymans League Division Three.

The gravity of the moment has raised awareness of the fact that just as it was supporters who made Roots Hall a reality, so they may have to lead the fight to ensure United's survival. And this is where the transformation of SUSC into the Southend United Supporters Club Trust comes in. This hugely complicated issue has been handled so far in the most professional way imagineable by our four-person team of Derek Murr, Paul, Trevor Bashford and Kirstine. They all deserve our gratitude for their commitment to a thorough investigation of the project and the time and effort they have put in. Kirstine, unfortunately, has just had to resign from both the committee and our Trust panel because of her new job – at Leyton Orient! We wish her well – off the pitch – and thank her for all her efforts. Martin Penton – you saw him for about two seconds as the half-time whistle sounded against Swansea on the Channel 5 TV documentary – is taking over on the Trust team. Plus we already have at least one more volunteer for the committee. Yes, we're that popular.

FORMATION of the Trust would mean establishing a charitable organisation to raise sufficient funds via the fans and the Football Trust to give us the financial clout to be a power within the football club. Shares would be bought if and when available and a board presence sought. Nothing can be done without the agreement of our membership, so do not feel there is any sort of fait accompli element here. An EGM will have to give the go-ahead and that is the point we are now at. The EGM will be held on TUESDAY, JULY 11 at the Shrimpers Club, kick-off 8pm. It is vitally important that as many as possible of our members attend. Derek has already produced a draft brochure for issue to explain all to every interested party. You should find one enclosed with this newsletter, along with a letter of explanation from Trevor. If not it will turn up. We hope Brian Lomax, who was a major figure in the Northampton Town trust, will attend the EGM to give further details and clarification on what is involved. Major decisions have to be made and if you genuinely care about Blues your voices have to be heard at this crucial gathering. Our aims and objectives will remain the same - 100 per cent backing for Southend United FC. In other words 'To help - not hinder'. We want to get John Main on board and hope he can see why we are heading where we are. We reviewed the Player of the Season awards night and agreement was unanimous – a stonking hit to be repeated next year. It was felt Alan Little would have been better advised to come along, though nine points from our first three games will probably see him almost forgiven. It appears the players were so much in the party mood that afterwards they could not make up their minds between Tots and a trip to Romford to keep the good times rolling. Martin (prize purchasing), Derek (organisation) and Jeff Allen (Mr PA) all received further well merited pats on the back, while Julian Hails sent us a very nice letter of appreciation for the decanter presented to him by SUSC on his untimely retirement.

SEASON ticket price rises were basically regarded as highly unfortunate, but simply to be expected with the current state of United's finances. There appears the usual lack of thought, though. OK, it is nice to have a family enclosure. But if you prefer to sit elsewhere in the West Stand, why should kids' tickets go up so drastically to \pounds 135 if you sign up post-June 23? The East Stand looks the best bargain, but is the most expensive area of the ground anyway. Deferred payments have been axed and no one has forgotten last season's sneaked in \pounds 1 rise (another Storrie in memoriam), so it will be interesting to see how the fans react. Billericay, Purfleet, East Thurrock Utd and Great Wakering might yet be rubbing their hands – and filling their boots.

SUSC has agreed to let the football club mail our members with information about the club shop, special offers etc. Any member who is not happy with this should contact Paul and he will remove your name from the list.

The Open Day on July 16 should see our zone centred round a bouncy castle of some description. We will also be raffling the shirts of our sponsored duo Martin Carruthers and Neville Roach (small sewing jobs required on each). Anyone who cannot attend on the 16th but who wants to try for a shirt can purchase raffle tickets

from Trevor by post. He will then enter your numbers in the draw. Simple. We plan to back Mr Carruthers again next season, along with Gary Cross. Also agreed is one more piece of well-merited financial aid. Tony Hall has asked if we would sponsor one of the Junior Blues sides next season and we reckon it would be around £300 meritoriously spent.

Well, we discovered in the end which of the playing staff were being given their bicycle clips. I was no great fan of Simon Coleman and never understood why he remained as captain to the bitter end, but he deserved better than to get his cheerio notice in the post. Such incidents say a lot about the PR of a football club – and that apparent gaffe, similarly suffered by Mark Beard, said sub-standard on this occasion. Perhaps they were paying him back for his awful programme notes.

I take it you all saw comedian Terry Alderton's documentary about Blues – M.Y.F.C. Though as it was screened at the ludicrous hour of 11.40pm, I suspect 99 per cent of the nation missed it.
