Nevertheless the event attracted several people who had not attended a Trust event before – including the winner who wasn't even a Trust member – but is now! We plan to run another in the New Year although the format may change slightly as an event lasting over 5 hours put several committee members' stamina to the test!

Shrimpers Trust increase involvement with Club

The past twelve months has seen the Shrimpers Trust further enhance its involvement in Southend United's Youth Department.

Following on from the early success of sponsoring the travelling costs of Joel Ledgister, a promising winger, and Reiss Noel, a commanding centre-half, soon after Ricky Duncan's return to the club in 2005, last summer saw the Shrimpers Trust commit a sum of £5,000 in each of the following two seasons to help finance the highly-successful European Tour Programme.







The Trust then made an additional commitment early in 2008 in order to see their logo emblazoned on the front of the Under-18s' shirts until May 2009. This team has also reached notable heights, finishing inside the top four in both of Duncan's first two campaigns in charge and defeating Academy outfits Derby County and Stoke City in an historic run to the last sixteen of the F.A. Youth Cup last term.

Monthly Shrimpers Trust SUFC Youth Team Player of the Month awards are handed out on the Roots Hall pitch throughout the season, with the winners automatically nominated for the Tom Grace Memorial Shield for the Youth Team Player of the Year at the organisation's End of Season Review evening.

Three members of the Trust committee have recently been elected onto the Youth Development Association committee, which helps to monitor funds raised through the Blues Lottery for the Centre of Excellence. Trust spokesman Robert Craven said, *"The Shrimpers Trust is delighted to help Ricky Duncan and his backroom team produce the future stars of Southend United. The progression of the likes of Franck Moussa and Charles Ademeno in Ricky's short time at the club shows that there is a great deal for supporters to be positive about, and that fans can have an influence in shaping the team of tomorrow."*

The Trust's backing for Southend United does not end there though, and money raised from this season's Quid-a-Goal initiative will go towards the Southend United Community & Educational Trust team headed by Steve Goodsell. In the past, we have also committed large sums of money from this scheme to Club Physiotherapist John Stannard, whilst last season we helped Paul Brush complete his FA Pro-License with the donation of £1000.

The value of the Trusts contribution to the Club was echoed by the Clubs Director of Commercial Services, Garry Adamson:

"Since I came to the club I have really enjoyed working with the Trust. Not only do they do a good job in representing supporter views, their support of the Youth Department is extremely important to us. "For example, this extra cash helps us to buy the latest equipment which helps the players develop and also helps to attract youngsters to come to Southend. We hope to continue our positive relationship for years to come which will help us towards our aim of playing academy football in the short term."

MATCH REPORTS - Bashford's Banter

Saturday 30th August 2008 – Walsall Town (Away) – Result (L) 5-2

What will be, will be!!!!!! Summer football returned at last and we actually saw some sunshine!!! Major road rage on the journey to the game – when will car drivers realise that coaches are bigger then them!!!!!!!

A game of two halves – now where have I heard that before? Walsall showed there attacking intent right from the beginning of the game with a shoot on site policy albeit in the early stages most shots went high, wide and trickled to Mildenhall. One team change Sawyer starting in place of the unluckily suspended Moussa and the bench strengthened by the return from injury of Walker and Scannell. Where were our new French mercenaries? Southend "took the lead" after 15 minutes when a Sawyer cross was "touched in" by Revell only for an eagle eyed linesman / assistant referee (whatever their title is nowadays) to flag for offside. In the 21st minute Walsall hat-trick hero Demontagnac get his first shot on target fortunately for us he was denied by the post, but two minutes later we were 1-0 down when a cross from the right was not cleared by the Southend defence, fell to Reich who volleyed home. Very worrying was that the German attempted to celebrate with the non existent fans in the away end – we had been moved to the side. Southend were playing well and the fluency seen against Brighton returned and we equalised in the 33rd minute when another fine cross from Sawyer was headed on by Grant and Kanu-Robson scored. Both sides continued to attack and Southend created one of the best efforts but Revell hit his shot straight at the Walsall keeper.

What was put in the players' tea at half time? I think both sets of players were drugged one team with "uppers" and the other "downers". Half way through the second half we were 4-1 down. On 48 minutes Grant headed into his own net from a Reich cross; in the 50th minute a poor Clarke back header fell to Jabo who was tackled by Mildenhall and the ball fell to Demontagnac for his first goal and on 69th minutes Demontagnac headed home his second from a Palmer cross. Before that Betsy are some good play down the right wing hit the post but in the 84th minute it was all over when cross come shot from Demontagnac from out by the left hand corner flag flew into the net. A wonder goal, a fluke or a goal keeping error only Demontagnac or Mildenhall will know. Southend continued to attack and in the closing stages Walker collected a long clearance, passed to Barnard and it was 5-2. Two second half substitutions Walker for Revell and Scamell for Robson-Kanu. Too little too late!!!!!"

Saturday 6th September 2008 – Carlisle United (Away) – Result (L) 2-1

It seems like only yesterday (i.e. early April) that hundreds of Southend fans made the long journey to Carlisle to see Southend win a vital promotion game in Cumbria. In atrocious "summer" weather conditions (i.e. torrential rain and wind) a reduced number of fans set off for Carlisle not knowing whether the game was on of off. These who made the circa 750 mile return journey were rewarded with a much improved Southend performance and all agreed that we did not deserve to lose our third league game on the trot but this is why we follow football !!!!!!!!!

For the second Saturday running it was a game of two halves with all three goals scored by the side with the wind behind them.

Steve Tilson gave league debuts to Freedman and Christophe that, on the day, appeared to improve the balance of the team. A wonder curler from the experienced Freedman after 22 minutes gave Southend the lead – reward for some good play in the early stages of the game when we by far the better side. Ben Williams in







the Carlisle goad was far busier than our own Mildenhall who was very confident with everything that Carlisle through at him. As always the travelling fans got behind their team and certainly made more news than the home fans. They got behind Mildenhall, who had received some unnecessary abuse in the previous Tuesday's "Mickey Mouse" cup game Vs Orient. If only some of the chances that we created had been scored!! Kanu-Robson cautioned after 34 minutes for "a player running into him". Whether the correct player was cautioned is debatable.

As already stated a game of two halves and for the second week running Carlisle came back from 1-0 down to win. They made good use of the wind and rain and played the ball "on the floor" but our boys still looked dangerous on the break. Christophe cautioned after 50 minutes closely followed by Horwood and Thirwell of Carlisle. The equaliser came on 63 minutes, the referee awarding a penalty following a foul by Peter Clarke and Graham scored from the spot. Both sides continued to push forward looking for the winner and on 79 minutes after some good play down the left, a cross, which Southend had opportunities to clear found its way to Cleveland-Taylor who hit an unstoppable shot past Mildenhall. Southend continued to push forward looking for the equaliser but with no luck – the Carlisle defence held firm. Three substitutes made Walker for Robson-Kanu (76 minutes); Furlong for Barnard (86 minutes and Furlong for Betsy (86 minutes).

A better performance and on journey home all agreed that we at least deserved a point and Carlisle were "lucky" but unfortunately statistics do not lie and show a record of 5 games played; 1 win; 1 draw and three consecutive league defeats. No need to panic because we were in a similar position last season and look where we ended up!!!!! We must not lose faith with Steve Tilson, Paul Brush and the current squad of players.

Good luck to Matt Harold at Wycombe Wanderers. Will miracles happen and he starts to score goals like a number of our ex strikers?

As one who is normally critical of the stewards and security personnel at Carlisle I would like to complement them for allowing the Southend fans to move "to the left" (i.e. closer to the field of play) and for moving one of disabled fans and his father from sitting in an area fully exposed to the elements into a seating area under cover. If only the seven year old muppet and his dad who threw a brick at one of the supporters' coaches had the same brains.

The tide has hopefully turned after our second home win of the season. Sunshine returned to Root Hall after weeks of rain

- Brian Dear retired after many years of loyal service to Southend following his playing career with West Ham United now who will tell the story of the famous hat-trick?
- The Board aka Uncle Ron declare the fans cannot criticise Tilly and Brush but....

Saturday saw Southend United make a bright with numerous opportunities being created before we scored the only goal of the game:

- 4th minute and Walker cuts in from the left and shoots just wide
- 6th minute and a poor back pass sees Freedman denied by the Hereford goalkeeper
- 9th minute and a cross Francis sets up a goal attempt for Barnard which again is just
- Numerous corners and good runs from mid-field from Betsy, Sawyer and Walker but to no avail.

The goal came on 29 minutes when, after good work by Betsy down the right, a cross from Francis was laid back by Freedman and Barnard fires home his first home league goal of the season. The fans were now







expecting a cricket score but Southend being Southend let Hereford back into the game and pushed forward by ex Shrimper Ben Smith Hereford created some chances of their own but stubborn defending and good goal keeping kept them to nil.

Hereford started the second half strongly but never looked like scoring. They were one of the weakest teams seen at Roots Hall for many a year but as Southend dominated, the fans became frustrated because no goals arrived and there is always the worry bead that, as seen in recent weeks, Southend will implode and give away silly goals. An injury to Mildenhall ten minutes from the end had Blues fans "holding their breath". Fortunately he played on, the ten players in front of him kept Hereford at bay, although if I was the Hereford manager I would be "throwing the tea cups around" at the lack of chances created with an immobile goalkeeper in place. Two late chances from Done and a back pass from Christophe, for which he could not stop apologising, were the sum today of normal play and six minutes of injury time.

Hopefully the injury is not serious as Mildenhall was starting to win over the doubters after their mindless chanting against Orient in the "Mickey Mouse" cup.

Tilly made two changes in the starting line-up with Walker and Sawyer returning and Grant and Robson-Kanu dropping down to the bench. Three tactical, time wasting substitutions late in the game Grant for Sawyer; Robson-Kanu for Walker and Scannell for Barnard helped run down the clock, put some fresh legs on the field and protect a 1-0 lead. Francis was the only Southend player cautioned when he took a booking on the half way line to prevent a Hereford breakaway.

I know we are not allowed to challenge any body at the club but it would be nice to answer the following questions:

- Why no goalkeeper on the bench?
- Why are we paying Ritchie Foran but not playing him?
- As some of the loan players will return to their clubs shortly, albeit playing well, why was Moussa not in the "16"?
- Other than Sankofa and Herd where is our defensive cover should any of the back four be injured or suspended?
- After all the rain in recent weeks why do we waste money and use the sprinkler system in watering the pitch before the game and at half time a waste of resources?
- Will we now be allowed to eat chips now that Brian Dear has retired?

Two wins on the trot. Hopefully our season will now get underway and we can challenge the "big boys" Leeds United, Leicester City and Millwall for some silverware and hopefully promotion in May 2009.

What a fantastic advertisement for attacking football with seven goals, more goal attempts than seen all season (including the 5-2 drubbing at Walsall) but what a nightmare for the two managers with some school boy defending offset by some world class tackles. At times the football was like "a hot potato / stick of dynamite" that no-one wanted to hold and use as a creative implement.

A measly crowd of 3,574 (I bet Crewe take more than that to Anfield in mid-week) saw a fantastic match in beautiful sunshine. Even though the Southend fans had a nightmare journey with traffic jams from Northampton (M1) to Stoke (M6) the journey was worthwhile. Even referee Mr Bratt joined in the fun with only one yellow card and that was to Kevin Betsy for a tired, late challenge from behind in the last few minutes of the game. No doubt wasted a bit more time!!!!!

Cries of "USA, USA, USA" from the travelling fans greeted the announcement of Ian Joyce for his league debut in English football, the only change to the team that started against Hereford the previous week. What an introduction when in the first few minutes Crewe hit a post and the rebound fired straight at him for a comfortable save. Where was the defence? Only minutes later Southend were one nil up when Freedman capitalised on a sloppy back pass to fire the Blues into the lead. After 21 minutes the travelling Blues Army were ecstatic when Francis's cross from the right wing was deflected into his own net by Baudet, the Crewe







central defender for a 2-0 lead. By 26 minutes Crewe had pulled a goal back when O'Connor's shot, which appeared to be going miles wide hit Peter Clarke and flew into the back of the net leaving Joyce totally stranded. Play was end to end and there were chances for both sides:

- a Zola bicycle kick just over the bar
- a fantastic last ditch tackle from Clarke denying Grant a scoring opportunity
- shots from Sawyer, Christophe and Freedman all going close

The equaliser come on 42 minutes when Pope ran onto a long ball from the busy O'Connor and slid the ball past Joyce. A suspicion of off-side but no complaints from the away team. No doubt Tilly asked a few questions at half time in respect of marking (i.e. how did Pope escape his marker?).

Both sides made substitutions ahead of a barn storming finale, Revell for Barnard, Robson-Kanu for Walker and "Snoop Dog" Grant for Sawyer. Southend were now a strong attacking force but to keep everyone interested the visiting kept giving away silly free kicks in their own half. Two minutes from the end another shot from the effective Freedman was deflected to Grant and he gratefully accepted his first Southend goal but more importantly made the score 4-3 to the visitors. Some clever play by Scottish international Freedman kept the ball in the corner for a large proportion of the time remaining and at last Mr Bratt blew the final whistle and the away fans and players were in raptures – even Uncle Ron came onto the pitch!!!!!!. *A great day for football supporters but a bad day for managers*.

Friday night football returned to Roots hall for the first time this season and a bumper crowd, including a large number of supporters from East London (and one Orient fan from Spain), of 9,261 was there to see a thrilling but one sided game of football. By the time our third goal was scored the, a large of away supporters had deserted the North Bank.

What a fantastic performance from the Shrimpers. The whole team performed magnificently, dominating every aspect of the game despite the thugery of a number of Orient players who from the word go were determined to kick Southend off the park. A poor refereeing performance, where have I seen or heard that before, did not help the game. A couple of early yellow cards for poor tackles on Freedman and his colleagues might have allowed the game to flow even more than was actually seen on the night.

Steve Tilson made two changes from the starting line-up at Crewe – Federici, on loan from Reading, replacing Joyce in goal and Robson-Kanu for Walker on the left side of mid-field. One other change on the bench was the return of Alan McCormack from injury replacing Scannell. Federici, albeit hardly troubled looked very confident and dominated the penalty area – not sure why Joyce was replaced after a competent performance against Crewe and could not be blamed for any of the Crewe goals. I salute the Southend United fans who in their hundreds stood on an open terrace at the mercy of the worst weather seen since we travelled to Carlisle; I salute the Southend United players who in a swirling wind and torrential rain played exceptionally to collect three points; I also applaud the Southend United fans who decided to sit in the stands – they had more sense that the majority. Pity that Yeovil Town did not use common sense and move all the travelling fans into one of the half empty stands – would have saved the stewards and travelling fans getting soaked!!!!!! The support from the terrace and stands was "out of this world" and great to see all the players and staff show their appreciation at the end.

This was not a day for the soccer purist. Gone were the opportunities for the mid-field players to make telling cross-field passes or long balls from the back for the front runners to run onto, the wind dictated the play and it was a game of hard graft and short passes on the ground. Southend made one change to the starting 11 with Alex Revell replacing the injured Dougie Freedman, who appeared on more TV programmes this weekend than Simon Cowell, and Damien Scannell returning to the bench.

Yeovil started brightly and striker Gavin Tomlin looked dangerous but the defence and Adam Feredici stood firm. Chances were always going to be at a premium and Southend got their break in the 24th minute when Brown fouled Lee Barnard to give away a penalty. The defender was yellow carded and Barnard coolly slotted home the spot kick. This was the break that Southend required and the fans thought that soon after we should have received a second penalty when Brown again appeared to have fouled Barnard but this was waived on by referee Hill. Yeovil continued to attack and two great saves from Federici, one in each half kept the home side at bay.

The second half followed the pattern of the first with dogged mid-field play and heavy tackles in worsening conditions. This led to bookings for Christophe, Harding and McCormack of Southend and Roberts and Peltier of Yeovil. McCormack was introduced in the 53rd minute, replacing the injured Christophe, and immediately fired a long range effort just wide and in one of his first tackles was cautioned – welcome back Alan!!!!!!!! The game was end to end but with few goal scoring chances, albeit Yeovil did hit a post until 86th minute when a wonder goal from Robson-Kanu, after great work down the right, put the Blues 2-0 up. Southend being Southend decided they wanted to make the last few minutes interesting and in the 88th minute, with the home fans steaming out of the ground, Schofield fired home a shot from the right to make in 2-1. Winter came early to the South of England with games at Walsall, Luton, Northampton and Wycombe either postponed or abandoned due to heavy snow. Southend United fans saw a fantastic team performance that "warmed the cockles of one's heart".

Steve Tilson made three changes to the side that started at Bristol Rovers – Dan Harding returned from suspension in place of Osei Sankofa; the fit again Lee Sawyer replaced Alan McCormack and Monsieur Laurent replaced the out of sorts James Walker. The three replaced players joined "Snoop Dog" Antony Grant and Damien Scannell on the bench.

What a fantastic start by Southend and Laurent in particular who caused all sorts of problems with his pace – but this was not a one man performance with every member of the squad playing an active and vital role.
