

On 6th August, Martin Cranmer, a founder member of the current supporters club (pre Trust) died whilst on holiday with his wife Zoe – he was 40. Our thoughts are with Zoe and family. A period of consolidation both on and off the field would be most welcome with perhaps a sprinkling of good news - or is that asking a little too much?

The Trust is always looking for more ideas and indeed help – we do a variety of things and are always grateful for help – if anyone would like to get involved with the committee to improve what we do for the club, you would be most welcome. In particular, our regular minute taker has broken his pencil and we desperately need someone who could spare a few hours a month (usually on the first Monday) to take minutes and generally contribute to the trust activities.

YOUTH TEAM - A MATCH TO REMEMBER

Colchester United U18s 0 – 5 Southend United U18s Saturday 22nd October 2010

Braces from Julian Okai and Duane Ofori-Acheampong, plus an own goal from defender George Allen, contributed to a terrific 5-0 local derby win for Southend United's Under-18s away to Colchester.

Blues' Youths had triumphed in a five-goal thriller at the Garrison 'B' Ground just three weeks ago to secure progress in the Football League Youth Alliance Cup, but this time they contributed all the goals in the match to inflict a heavy reverse on their north Essex rivals.

With second-year scholar Alex Woodyard travelling to Bury with the first-team squad after his match-winning strike for the Shrimpers' reserve team against the U's in midweek, James Stevens was reintroduced to the starting line-up in midfield whilst Luke Chambers came in for Daniel Bentley in goal to represent a second change to the eleven that drew 0-0 with Gillingham last weekend.

Blues had dominated that particular fixture, but there were early signs that this was going to be a stronger test when former Southend youngster Freddie Ladapo hooked the ball over the defence in the fifth minute and skipper Craig Arnott slashed wildly wide.

In general the hosts, who had been weakened by injuries, made a frenetic start and Southend took some time to calm the match down. Gradually, through Stevens, Michael Hyland and George Smith in the centre of the pitch, they did so and, after 11 minutes, Teddy Nesbitt created the Shrimpers' first opening, with Hicham Abdellah unable to direct the full-back's cross goalwards at the back post.

After a quarter-of-an-hour, Blues were in front. Hyland slid the ball out to the left-hand side where diminutive winger **Okai** raced past Mason Stewart before sending an unstoppable shot into the top right-hand corner past Shaun Phillips.

At the time, Colchester were down to ten men as Tosin Olufemi received treatment and his replacement, Ross Gilfedder, had a chance to equalise with his first touch as the U's broke away from the restart, the substitute seizing on an under-hit header from Kane Ferdinand but sending his finish wide of the left-hand upright.

The visitors began to grow in confidence having taken the lead, although they were continually unable to find the target as Ferdinand powerfully nodded an Abdellah centre wide, Ofori-Acheampong galloped into the penalty area but hoisted a shot past the right-hand post and Smith smashed a rising half-volley narrowly over from 15 yards.

In between, Okai was only stopped from capitalising on a wonderful sweeping Stevens pass by an inch-perfect Stewart challenge, but the half ended with Colchester on top. Chambers produced a fine fingertip save to push a curling Ladapo shot out and the Essex Senior Cup winner fired over late on when Arnott's driven free-kick was deflected into his path.

The second half began with Chambers making a sprawling save to deny Gilfedder, and Blues doubled their advantage as a result in the 50th minute. The goal was made by Abdellah, who sent a teasing cross into the six-yard box from the right-hand side and, with Hyland lurking behind him, centre-half Allen inadvertently diverted the ball into his **own goal**.

Head of Youth Ricky Duncan took the opportunity to field Under-16 talent Lyle Della Verde as well as trialists Reece Hall and Steven Camacho, the latter a second-year scholar from Charlton Athletic, in the final 40 minutes of the match and Della Verde was unfortunate to see a skimming shot take a minute touch to send it wide after an enterprising run in the 66th minute.

Southend did score midway through the second half when Ferdinand showed excellent alertness to intercept Phillips' rolled clearance. The centre-half advanced to the bye-line, from where he cut the ball back to **Ofori-Acheampong**, who glanced it into the bottom right-hand corner.

Camacho's fierce effort was well-held by Phillips as the Shrimpers piled on the pressure and, after Chambers again looked impressive in parrying out a swerving Arnott attempt, they added a fourth with ten minutes remaining.

Della Verde started the move by lofting the ball over the top for Okai, who was closed down by 'keeper Phillips 30 yards out. The loose ball fell to Nesbitt, who immediately went for goal but saw the effort charged down into the path of Ofori-Acheampong, with the front-man then setting up **Okai** to roll in his third goal of the season.

Three minutes later, the rout was complete. Ofori-Acheampong battled hard for the ball up against Allen and Alex Gilbey, and then slid it in for Okai. The winger was denied a hat-trick when Phillips palmed away his shot, but **Ofori-Acheampong** continued his run and slammed the rebound into the net to record his fifth goal of the season.

Next weekend sees Southend take on Oxford United at Boots & Laces in the Second Round of the Youth Alliance Cup (kick-off 11:00am), with a date soon to be arranged for the FA Youth Cup First Round tie at Roots Hall against Luton Town.

Saturday 21st August 2010

Southend United lost their second consecutive league match after being played off the park by Port Vale at Roots Hall on Saturday. The deadly namesake-striking duo of Richards both netted a goal each as Paul Sturrock lost his first home game in charge of The Shrimpers.

So after last weeks 1-0 defeat at the EBB Stadium Paul Sturrock's side returned to Roots Hall and he had made 3 changes to his starting line-up for the visit of the Valiants. Graham Coughlan, Sofiene Zaaboub and Matt Paterson all earned a recall.

From the start of the game Port Vale looked the hungrier of the two sides and they took the lead inside 5 minutes when the two Richards combined to put the ball past Glenn Morris. Marc put the ball on a plate for Justin whom powered home a header from 6 yards out.

If it was not for Morris Blues could have been 3 or 4 down inside the first 20 minutes as he twice saved well from Marc Richards, however, Southend did respond when Zaaboub's free-kick was well saved by the Vale keeper and Coughlan then headed over when unmarked in the 6 yards box.

Luke Prosser was having a game to remember as he twice made crucial errors but was let off due to Vales poor finishing.

On 54 minutes Port Vale added a 2nd through Louis Dodds tapping home from close range after the visitors burst through the heart of Southend United.

Sturrock made a few changes as The Shrimpers were looking to halve the deficit and Irish forward Barry Corr should have got Southend back in the game but he headed well over the bar from a few yards out.

Marc Richards turned and fired home a curling effort into the far corner of Glenn Morris' goal, which put the game beyond doubt. The Seasiders did pull a goal back in the 88th minute when Louie Soares hit a free-kick that was deflected in his own net by Owen.

Ground Review:

I have previously visited Molineux when we were in The Championship and I have to say it was a better atmosphere back then, but the traveling Blues faithful were full of noise yet again, as we back our side. It is a lovely structured stadium that any side would be proud to call 'their home' but on the downside, the refreshments were priced highly and the service was poor.

Richard Stearman prodded home with the last kick of the game to deny Southend United taking Premiership side Wolves to a penalty shoot-out. Blues had forced extra-time when skipper Craig Easton headed home a Simpson cross to level the scores after an earlier Nenad Milijas penalty.

Paul Sturrock made 4 changes to his side that lost to Port Vale as he brought in Bilel Mohsni and Peter Gilbert for their debuts; Josh Simpson and Barry Corr, who did not start against the Valiants, joined them in the side.

From a supporter's point of view we were not expecting too much tonight, just a committed performance and maybe a goal to cheer, but we witnessed something really promising. From the first whistle we were challenging every ball and looked a very composed side when in position and had a few chances on goal. We also limited Wolves to half chances at best.

After pressure from Southend with efforts from Zaaboub and Grant, Wolves took the lead when Barker fouled Winnall in the box and Serbia World Cup star Nenad Milijas placed home the spot-kick.

The super Blues responded and twice went close through Bilel Mohsni. The first effort went wide when he looked offside then he headed home which was ironically ruled out for offside when he looked level with the last defender.

Southend were holding their own and went close when Blair Sturrock saw his left footed effort tipped brilliantly onto the bar by Welsh international Wayne Hennessey.

However in the 80th minute skipper Craig Easton equalised for Southend, ending a superb move. The move included Soares, Clohessy and Simpson with the latter curling in a super cross that invited Easton to nod home from 6 yards.

That forced extra-time and once Ebanks-Blake saw an effort ruled out for offside, Southend's tails were up and went close through Josh Simpson when he side footed straight at Hennessey.

And with 30 seconds remaining on the clock Richard Stearman pounced to fire Wolves into round 3 after Glenn Morris could only parry Zubar's cross-cum-shot.

Ground Review:

Valley Parade is a quality football stadium in my opinion. As Bradford are an ex-Premiership side, this ground wouldn't look out of place at the present time in the English top flight. The view for away supporters is not great, stuck on the side and in the corner of the ground, but it does have good acoustics that amplify the volume of away support. Supported by 2 other fantastic stands, and a slightly smaller one behind one of the goals it, as I said, would still be at home in the Premiership.

Barry Corr and Anthony Grant were on target as Southend United secured their first win of the season and their first away victory in 9 months. A goal in each half was enough for The Shrimpers in what was a dominant display. Ex-Blues manager Peter Taylor's Bradford side looked off the pace and did not bother Southend in any way, shape or form.

So after a promising display against Wolves on Tuesday, drawing in normal time, Southend hoped to continue this kind of form into the league after Saturday's disappointing display against Port Vale. The team bonding session in the north of the country seemed to be paying dividends as Blues dominated straight from kick-off.

Comfortable on the ball, Southend were looking lively, and nearly took the lead when Simpson got through on the right but took the wrong option of cutting the ball back when it looked better to have a strike on goal. However, Southend did get take the lead, which was fully deserved, through Irish forward Barry Corr.

The former Exeter forward controlled and turned brilliantly after collecting Ryan Hall's fantastic cross, before firing home via the joint of post and bar, to send us travelling fans wild. We did not stop there, we continued to battle and dominate the game, and went mighty close to doubling our advantage.

Bilel Mohsni missed two glorious opportunities before Ryan Hall and Blair Sturrock both went close, as did Josh Simpson. It took until the 54th minute to double our deserved lead when Anthony Grant met a neat Corr knockdown to rifle home a half volley into the bottom corner. The points were surely home and dry now, and we did not sit back, we continued and Barry Corr was inches away from converting a Blair Sturrock cross.

There was one nervous stage of the game when Sean Clohessy was sent off for his 2^{nd} booking, but the Blues held firm as Bradford failed to trouble our backline and our goalkeeper Glenn Morris.

Southend United win 4-3 on Penalties

Blair Sturrock scored the winning penalty as Southend United beat League Two rivals Gillingham in a penalty shoot-out after the fixture finished goalless after the regular 90 minutes of action. Blues are now into the hat for the 2nd round draw, and a step closer to the final at Wembley stadium.

So after tremendous performances away at Wolves and Bradford, Blues returned to home soil, to take on nPower League Two rivals Gillingham in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy. As a supporter that goes to games home and away, I have witnessed what this team can achieve, and was confident of knocking out the Kent based side.

The first half was totally dominated by Southend, who looked solid all over the park, and had the constant threat of Ryan Hall on the left-flank. However, despite the dominance of the ball, chances on goal were limited. Barry Corr had a few headers on goal for The Shrimpers but nothing that really tested the opposition.

Gillingham hardly attacked in the first half, but did cause a penalty melee during the closing stages of the first half, but that did not come to anything.

The second half was a much closer and even affair, which Gillingham probably just shaded, but yet again very little chances on goal. Former Blues midfielder Kevin Maher came the closest for The Gills when his quick control half volley flew just wide of the goal.

Southend nearly snuck the win when Paterson's missed control fell to Blair Sturrock, who steadied himself, but saw his effort well saved by the visiting goalkeeper.

That took the tie straight into a penalty shoot-out, as extra-time is not present in the JPT. Southend goalkeeper Rhys Evans made two penalty saves, as Southend won the tie thanks to spot-kick conversions from Paterson, Soares, Barker and Sturrock.

Saturday 4th September 2010

Southend United ended Torquay's 100% start to the season with a well-deserved victory at Roots Hall. Cracking goals from Anthony Grant and Josh Simpson gave the Blues the lead after a dominant first half but a Chris Zebroski stike with 10 minutes left meant a nervy conclusion for The Shrimpers, but they held on.

The Shrimpers entered the game against the current league leaders on the back of two consecutive victories. Those being a 2-0 win at Bradford City before edging out Gillingham on penalties in midweek. As I sat down in my seat, with my freshly printed 'Mohsni' shirt, I was very confident we could win. My pre-match prediction was a 2-1 home win and on the evidence of our first half display, that was possible.

Blair Sturrock, facing his former side, and Ryan Hall combined well to create early chances with Simpson and Sturrock going close. The Blues were rampant; Torquay didn't know what had hit them and in the 15th minute Southend took the lead.

A corner from Ryan Hall found its way to Anthony Grant who curled home a fantastic effort into the top corner of the goal, to celebrate his 2nd game in as many league games, and boy did it get me out of my seat!

The football being played was first class, and any fan that managed to get to Wolves and Bradford like myself, was finally seeing it played at Roots Hall, and that quality was rewarded thanks to a wonder strike from Josh Simpson. The midfielder smashed home a low, hard half-volley into the far corner to put Southend in cruise control.

Torquay hardly threatened and when they did, their finishing let them down.

As I retuned to my seat for the start of the second half I knew the next goal was vital. A 3rd for Southend would wrap up 3 points but a goal from the Gulls would change the whole aspect of the game.

The visitors did dominate the 2^{nd} half of the 2^{nd} half and did get given a life-line when Chris Zebroski netted from close range after a previous effort rebounded off the post.

Southend did hold on firm but did have Glenn Morris to thank for a stupendous low save to deny Torquay in the final minute.

Ground Review:

Sixfields is a decent football stadium for lower league football. Having visited this stadium on countless occasions I am still impressed with some of the features. With all-but one stand (main stand) having only 7 rows of seats it is hardly the largest of grounds and it does struggle to make any kind of atmosphere. The food outlets around the ground are still pricey and most of the pubs are home supporters only.

Southend United's run of 3 victories on the bounce was ended at Sixfields as the Cobblers came from a goal down to turn the match on its head. Having lead through an Anthony Grant volley, Blues shot themselves in the foot with sloppy defending, and despite their dominance on proceedings we could not force an equaliser.

After the last five or six matches consisting of top quality football from Southend I was really hoping we could continue our fine form at Sixfields. The level of our performance was really good again as we dictated large periods of the match, and if we brought our shooting boots with us, we would have been out of sight.

Blair Sturrock, who I believe doesn't get enough credit, sliced an awful effort wide of the goal when only 8 yards out. That brought a massive grown from the Blues faithful, but we kept playing our game. We were a force throughout.

Peter Gilbert was subject of home abuse, as expected, and Leon McKenzie looked a shadow of his former self. Being overweight and off the pace, certainly helped Blues' defensive state of mind.

So after domination in the first half, that continued into the first 20 minutes of the second half. We went close on three occasions before scoring and two of those efforts of note came from Anthony Grant and Chris Barker. However, on the 57th minute, Anthony Grant volleyed home a superb cross from Sean Clohessy to give the Blues a deserved lead. Despite taking the lead, we took our foot off the throttle and Northampton were back into the game.

Bilel Mohsni, shaken after getting booked, saw his clearance handled, but instead of playing to the whistle the back line stopped and that allowed Osman to fire home a shot past Morris and his near post.

Just 8 minutes later and The Cobblers completed the most unlikely of turnarounds when skipper Holt powered home a free header after Bilel lost his man. Southend could not force an equaliser, but if we had cut out the individual errors, the Blues faithful would have been celebrating a fourth consecutive success.

Individual errors proved to be Southend United's downfall for the second game in succession after they were beaten by 3 goals to 2 at home to Morecambe. Anthony Grant scored his 4th goal in 5 matches and he was joined on the score sheet by striker Barry Corr, notching his 3rd strike of the season, but Blues' backline couldn't hold firm to see out a game we really shouldn't have lost.

So after the disappointment of 2 mistakes against Northampton costing us a game we dominated from the start, we returned to Roots Hall, and I for one, was confident we would take all three points. Southend named new-boy Michael Timlin in midfield and it was Timlin that had the first shot on goal, but his free kick didn't trouble the keeper.

Backed by no more than 50 travelling fans, Morecambe without a win, but finished 4^{th} last year and tipped for promotion again took the lead when Drummond lashed home from close range after Blues failed to clear, and it was totally against the run of play.

Just seconds later Anthony Grant drilled a shot from 25 yards that flew into the bottom corner for his 4th goal in as many league games, and his 4th in 5th matches in all competitions. At this point I could only see one side winning, Southend against a very poor Morecambe side, but I was left scratching my head when The Shrimps scored just 4 minutes later when Mullin headed home unmarked from 5 yards, when in all honesty, Glenn Morris should have come for the ball.

Everyone in the ground could see that Southend were the only team in the game and 5 minutes after the break big Barry Corr out jumped Roche in the goal to score his 3rd goal of the season, and at this point

Southend must have thought they could win this game, and easily. Blair Sturrock had a shot go over; Ryan Hall came close twice as did Barry Corr, but Morecambe held firm.

And with 17 minutes to go, after pressing for the winner, a quick break away left substitute Spencer with the easiest of tasks of placing the ball past Morris. Everyone at the ground could see Blues bossed the game, and with scoring 2 goals at home, you would expect a win, but individual errors, not poor displays have seen the Blues lose their last 2 fixtures, when in fact, they deserved to win and would have been sitting in 6th place.

Ground Review:

This was my 2nd trip to Edgar Street, and it doesn't look any better second time round! They have added a few seats behind the goal as the away support was pushed around to the side. It was very hard to create any atmosphere, as the acoustics were very poor. And the food kiosk looked like a Victorian cookhouse rather than a Football League food stall.

Despite all of the above, these traditional grounds have something about them, which you don't get in most stadiums, that is passion.

Southend United moved to within a point of the play-offs after an easy victory at lowly Hereford. Despite falling behind early on Blues battled back and goals from Barry Corr, Michael Timlin and Blair Sturrock, the turnaround was completed.

So after 2 good displays, and no wins to show for it, Southend had to get back winning ways and with supporters in good spirits on the way down, I was positive we could win. Before the match, Blair Sturrock averaged a goal every 8 games, and 8 games after his last strike, could he repeat the trick?

Once in the ground, the Blues Voice, were singing but we were left gob smacked when a free kick from McQuilkin found its way past Morris. The keeper seemed to push the ball into his own goal via the crossbar. Not the best start.

I was still confident of winning, and despite the painful long balls in windy conditions, Southend scored a goal of real class in the 27th minute. A flowing move set Blair Sturrock away and the striker crossed a pinpoint ball into the box and Barry Corr angled his head to powerfully header home. Just seconds later Corr nearly scored his second but saw his header deflect wide.

Southend were miles better than Hereford and once they got the ball down on the deck and played football, there was only one winner. Barry Corr was unplayable and he knocked the ball down for Sturrock who was fouled and Southend scored from the resulting free kick.

Simpson laid the ball off for Michael Timlin who then curled a fantastic left-footed shot into the top corner of the goal, a truly wonderful effort, Southend were almost home and dry.

Barry Corr then went close on a few occasions, and also had an effort ruled out for offside. Ryan Hall and Blair Sturrock stung the fingers of the Hereford goalkeeper, and it was the latter that added to the score line when he burst free from the Bulls backline before sliding a left-footed shot into the far corner.

Southend United goalkeeper Glenn Morris produced a string of fine saves in the second half to keep Gillingham at bay. Despite dominating the first half, Southend found themselves on the back foot after the break, and had former Orient keeper Morris to thank on numerous occasions. Nathaniel Jarvis came the closest to winning the game for Blues but his effort was saved.

After a good away victory at Edgar Street on Saturday, we visited our near neighbours from Kent, at the Priestfield Stadium. I was very confident we would take all 3 points again tonight but was aware that Gillingham have only lost 3 games at home in over a season and a half.

Right from the first whistle of the first half, we dominated. We should have been celebrating an early goal but Louie Soares miscued from close range after a good ball to the back post from Clohessy. I was really impressed with what I was seeing, the same battle from Saturdays match was continued, and we should have scored again when good work from Blair Sturrock put Josh Simpson through but he rushed his shot and it flew wide of the goal.

Two goals from Matt Paterson fired Southend within 4 games of the showpiece final at Wembley. The former Southampton forward scored a goal in each half and was joined on the score sheet by Louie Soares as Southend easily progressed into the quarterfinal stage.

Blues were forced into making changes for tonight's Johnstone Paint Trophy match and all of the players recalled to the line-up did themselves no harm at all heading into a tough 4-match period for Southend.

Matt Paterson had a really good early chance to score, but his close range curling effort, was too easy for Cole in the Barnet goal. Anthony Grant then stung the fingers of Cole with a long, low hard drive. Barnet were a very poor side and in the 22nd minute Blues' dominance finally showed when Matt Paterson placed home a low drive after good work from Harry Crawford.

The forward, previously made available for loan by Paul Sturrock, stroked home with the inside of his foot into the far corner to send the 500+ away crowd into full voice. Ryan Hall came close to scoring a goal, which would have been goal of the season, but his fierce free-kick smashed off the post.

The Shrimpers were miles the better side, but things could have finished worse, when Bilel Mohsni saw red after a clash with Walsh. But just moments later the 10 men of Southend doubled their lead when Paterson raced onto a long ball before coolly lobbing the 'keeper.

Barnet pulled a goal back with a close range header, but Louie Soares capped off a great performance with a fine solo goal, beating 4 players before smashing a left footed drive into the roof of the net.

As the home team, you expect them to have most of the ball, but we seemed slow. After a few half chances, Chesterfield took the lead when Lester was chopped down by a combination of Coughlan and Grant. Whittaker stepped up to place home straight down the middle of the goal to put the hosts one goal up.

But since that goal went in, it was all Southend. First Chris Barker had a shot cleared off the line before we cemented lots of corners in succession. In the 36th minute Blues were level. A deep corner from Soares was controlled well and placed back to Grant by Fairhurst and Grant coolly placed home from the edge of the box into the bottom corner.

Nathaniel Jarvis saw a header just go over, before the sucker punch. With only 15 seconds remaining the linesman gave a corner when it was very clearly a goal kick. From the resulting corner, Chesterfield scored the winner, when comical defending left Boden time to turn and shoot past Morris to snatch a cruel and underserved victory for the hosts.

As The Blues pressed for the equaliser Crewe hit us on the counter attack. It was a freak goal as Johnny Herd lost possession and then got the wrong side of his man before allowing the cross to come in and Morris and Coughlan got in each other's way allowing Miller to prod home from 4 yards out.
