Ron has recently set up a new company and the Echo appeared quite interested/excited but it has always been Ron's plan to do. He had told the Trust on many occasions that he wanted a separate Board to run the new stadium, far away from the footballing side. The fact that he has chosen to do this now is interesting from a timing point of view and is hopefully a sign that real apparent progress on FF is not far away.

The "enabling development" that has always been suggested would bring extra revenue to the football club, is presumably going to be within this vehicle. Additionally, of course, we must not forget that the football club may be the first tenant. Ron stated in open forum that the rent charged at FF to the football club would be at an affordable level and bearing in mind the club hasn't paid any rent for many years one would assume that they have not been able to afford any...suggesting that the affordable level of rent is in fact zero. I'm sure Ron will be addressing this situation in the fullness of time.

SHRIMPERS TRUST AGM - Report by Rob Craven

Southend United club captain Craig Easton took time out of his schedule to attend the Shrimpers Trust Annual General Meeting on Thursday 11th November and, after the formal business of the evening had been concluded, he answered questions from the assembled supporters.

Having watched on intently to the reports from Trust chairman Paul FitzGerald, treasurer Darren Posnack and membership secretary Paul Yeomanson, Easton then saw the existing Officers voted back on before the Trust Board and General Committee - including new members Gary Crowe and Lesley Hicks - followed suit.

The 31-year-old moved onto the top table himself at around 8:50pm and answered questions for an hour. Having explained the general format for training during the week, including regeneration sessions after a match and a double-session on non-matchday Tuesdays, Easton soon settled into his stride.

Asked about Tuesday's narrow 1-0 Johnstone's Paint Trophy defeat to Charlton Athletic, the former Leyton



Orient midfielder talked about the role of the midfield in the reverse: "Even in the Torquay [United] match, sometimes we dropped too deep. I was saying to the other players on Tuesday night that we were doing that, but Charlton are a good side; they have got good forwards and it was a new defence for us," he stated.

Easton was quick to quash any rumours of dressing room unrest after team-mates exchanged frank views to each other on the field in the home win over Rotherham United: *"There was a wee bit the other day; Bilel* [Mohsni]'s a bit mad! I can tell you now that 99% of the time, it only lasts as long as you saw on the pitch and that's the end of it. Sometimes it'll carry on a bit in the dressing room, but I'll be honest and I say I don't mind a little bit of that; it shows the team spirit we have."

"Both the gaffer [Paul Sturrock] and Tommy [Widdrington] are good man-managers, and the players will respond to them. The team-talks are good and myself, Graham Coughlan and Chris Barker all chip in. It's a great dressing room and the lads all get on together. That's a good thing because, on the pitch, when you're covering for a mate, you can make an extra tackle. Working hard is a minimum requirement, and only twice this season has the gaffer thought we could do more."

"We brought in two lads in a position we needed to strengthen, and obviously we have Matt Paterson as well. We felt it was a chance at Macclesfield [Town] to see what the boys could do. For Barry [Corr] and Blair [Sturrock] it's an incentive to get their place back in the team. Everyone wants to play football, including Barry, and he'll respond," the Scot declared later in the evening.

Over a number of seasons, the influx of loan players to Roots Hall has increased, and Easton acknowledged that this was now part of the game before explaining that it can work to a squad's advantage: "You come into a squad and train; it's really easy. Football's that kind of game, so someone will usually know you. The two lads at Macclesfield last week did well and they'll be healthy competition for Barry and Blair. That game was good as we were in a hotel, so we could have a laugh and a joke and bond a little," he said.

"Any club that I have been to have used loan signings, and I think that it will happen more and more; that seems to be the way that football in going. [Nathaniel] Jarvis and [Wade] Fairhurst didn't make an impression, but maybe these two lads will. At Orient when I was there the gaffer brought in a lad, Ryan Jarvis, and he scored a few goals at the end of the season to help us stay up."

When quizzed about his decision to join the Shrimpers, the one-time Dundee United youngster was quick to praise his manager, going on to reveal that he could have signed for a Scottish Premier League club before electing to move to south-east Essex.

"I was only saying to the gaffer the other day that it must be hard for you as fans, but the lads who have come in are all committed; we don't want to play in League Two. I don't want to play in League Two. The gaffer has done well to bring players in," he claimed.



"I was told by a few people not to touch Southend with a bargepole. I came down, and in training there were only eight players there, but I knew the gaffer and the players started coming in. Graham Coughlan said to me that the gaffer would get players in and he did."

"It's testament to the gaffer that people want to come to play down and play for him. He's had a lot of success, and it was his draw that attracted them. I've worked with him three times now. It was a hard choice for me; Terry Butcher wanted me to go to Inverness, and I've played for him before at Dundee United, but I felt it was a bigger challenge here."

With widespread changes to personnel in the squad, it may have taken some time for the players to get to know each other, but Easton insisted that putting points on the board was now a priority: *"I don't want to make excuses about gelling; we've had three months together now, so its consistency. Are we good enough? I look around and we have the players, and the gaffer thinks that as well. I hope Granty* [Anthony Grant] *stays with us, and big Bilel at the back. If we can add one or two, and I'd love to see Josh Simpson stay, we've got as good a squad as anyone in this League. I'd take our squad over any other in our League."*

"5,500 haven't seen us at our best; those that have been to Chesterfield and Bradford have seen a different team. Anyone that has consistency will get promoted; I'd love to have a magic wand, but we'll keep working hard. You might get a few more Torquay United's and then the standards slip, but we'll keep on working on consistency."

One man that Easton knows very well is former loanee Michael Timlin and he was pleased with his temporary addition: "When I got injured, the gaffer said he was bringing Michael in and I knew that he would do a good job. I've played with him at Swindon, and I've spoken to him and he didn't want to go back; he was enjoying his time here. There is a difference between the two changing rooms."

In addition to the well-documented success over Torquay, Blues put in excellent pre-season displays against higher-division opposition in Derby County and West Ham United at Roots Hall, and Easton, who opened his goalscoring account for the club in another impressive performance at Wolverhampton Wanderers in the Carling Cup, believes that Southend are capable of more in front of their own supporters.

"League Two is like that, maybe we need to pass the ball a bit more. The Derby and West Ham games were very different to League Two games, and any time we have done well it's been against the better teams. We have the battlers for those other games," he proclaimed.

"We've played our best football away. Statistics show that a lot of teams' away form is better than their home. You are more focussed to do a job when you go away, and at home you probably try a few things. You go away, you're tighter, at home there's expectation, and when you go away it's the same for them. I was talking to Terry Butcher the other day, and Inverness are unbeaten since last November away. Dundee United are the only team in the top half of the SPL, including Rangers and Celtic, whose home form is better than their away."

"To get a goal at the moment, we seem to have to get a decent one. Sometimes you have to get scrappy ones. I was speaking to the gaffer about it the other day, and we will be working on it. I

normally just play in midfield, but we've got players like Granty and I think Josh Simpson will get some. Everyone needs to chip in, not just the strikers. I hope we can keep a hold on Granty."

"Anyone that scores goals moves on as they are a sought-after commodity. At Swindon, Billy Paynter did well and moved on to a Championship side. It's hard to get them, but I think there are goals in Barry and Blair. Blair has had a few assists."

"We've been working on getting into the box. We know that bodies in the box are what we need; Blair's not going to score goals when he's out on the wing. Tommy put a crossing and finishing session on the other day and it was a great session. We do work on it all the time. We've got to get in front of the goalkeeper - we do it in training and when it happens it's great. On DVDs we can look at things like that,



and these coaching points are brought up. Players do get told if they get it wrong, whether that's being offside from short corners or foul throws."

As the evening drew to a close, Easton ended on a light-hearted note by disclosing that the squad had been keeping an eye on ITV2's *The Only Way In Essex* as he spoke about his return to the county: *"I've been here before, in Buckhurst Hill, for a couple of years. We've been watching that programme; Peter Gilbert comes into training every day and tells us what's going on! I've settled in well, I'm living in Leigh-on-Sea and my wife likes it."*

SUFC EGGHEADS

On Monday 21st November, an episode of Eggheads featuring myself and other Southend United supporters finally aired.....a mere 10 months after having been filmed! And those 10 months have been torture for the team as we were sworn to secrecy as part of our contracts.

It was in the winter of 2008/9 that a group of us, playing regularly in a Sunday night quiz on the popular online Southend United fans' forum, ShrimperZone, began to discuss the idea of putting together a team to take part in Eggheads. Co-ordinated by Paul Cox, of Milton Keynes, a team was eventually entered and invited to audition in London in June 2009. The team consisted of Paul, myself, Harry Roberts from Canvey, Ian Crossman from Southampton, Richard Reade from Glasgow and reserve, Scott Clough from Hutton, so we were a fairly far flung lot, and those auditions were actually the first time we had met Ian face to face although the rest of us had managed to meet up at various matches and club and ShrimperZone events in the past.

Having sailed through the auditions, we were quickly accepted and immediately invited to attend for filming, which we had to decline as it was just too short notice. That, unfortunately, signaled the Page 6 of 13

end of filming of Eggheads in London prior to moving to the BBC studios in Glasgow, and it was this change that meant we had to endure a very long wait to be called to film.



Eventually, we got the call just before Christmas 2009 and were asked to be in Glasgow for filming on 20th January. Opting to travel the day before, 5 of us were put up in a very pleasant hotel prior to filming the show. We were told to report to the BBC at 9 o'clock in the morning, and were met and put through our paces. We'd been told to bring at least three changes of tops so that they could decide who was wearing what, the instructions were to "think box of Smarties"!!! Unfortunately we weren't allowed to wear anything with logos on, so no SUFC branded tops of any kind. They actually film five Egghead shows a day and with the addition of two newer members, this allows the Eggheads themselves to be rotated so it meant we

didn't know who we were going to be up against. We were due to go to the recording studio at 11 o'clock but the show prior to us had over run, meaning it was an extra hour to wait.

Entering the studios, the three men on the team we were to play, Chris, Barry and Pat came straight over to us and shook our hands and had a bit of a chat. The two ladies, Judith and Daphne joined a bit later. They were all very nice, Judith has quite a good sense of humour! You're not told until Jeremy Vine announces it, how much you're playing for so it is a genuine look of surprise, or it was, when he announced we were playing for £21,000.

First round was Geography with Ian taking on Pat, then Film and TV with Richard taking on Chris before I got lumbered with the one none of us really wanted, Art and Books, and took on Barry. We all lost our rounds, before Harry came in taking Judith on at Sports and taking her to "Sudden Death" before beating her, meaning we had Paul and Harry in the final General Knowledge round. They did really well, but unfortunately not well enough and before too long, we'd lost.

Still, we had an amazing experience, not one many football supporting groups can boast and we were able to get some pics with the Eggheads at the end. We've not been able to tell anyone how we did though because if you win, apparently you don't get paid until your show airs to keep the suspense going!

Ground Review:

Gigg Lane is a bog-standard League Two ground with only one-tiered stands. Normally these smaller grounds create a great atmosphere but the acoustics at this ground were very poor.

For a club of Bury's stature it is enough, but it could do with a few licks of paint and the posts holding the stands up did block most supporters' views that were not directly behind the goal.

Joe Skarz's glancing header 5 minutes before the break condemned Southend to their 3rd straight defeat as they slipped down to 18th position in League Two. Despite a much better performance after the break, Blues could not take any of their many chances, to make it 3 defeats on the trot.

The game started pretty even with both sides knocking the ball around well. However, in just the third minute, Southend were under pressure when Ajose went down under the challenge of Chris Barker. The Man Utd. youngster did make the most of the very little contact present.

From the resulting spot-kick Glenn Morris produced a stunning save to deny Ryan Lowe and push the ball behind for a corner. From that moment Bury wanted revenge and only a world class save from Morris kept the scores level.

Just before the half-time whistle the referee made Bury take the free kick again after their first two efforts being judged not to be legal, and from the curling free-kick former Huddersfield defender Skarz glanced a header into the bottom corner of the goal.

Despite Bury being in front there was nothing between the two sides if the truth were told. In the second half Southend were much better with every player demanding the ball.

Josh Simpson should have done better and so should Clohessy when he opted to try and lob the keeper when a hard low effort perhaps would have been better.

A free flowing move from Southend nearly ended with a stunning goal. Grant, Timlin, Hall and Gilbert were all involved but Barry Corr couldn't keep his header down and the chance had gone.

Michael Timlin saw his 25-yard volley saved well by the rookie goalkeeper as Bury looked to hang on. Nathaniel Jarvis also saw an effort go close but his shot smashed into the side netting as Southend slumped to yet another defeat.

An early goal from Blair Sturrock ensured Southend ended a run of three straight defeats against high-flying Rotherham at Roots Hall. Blair chested home from close range, to score his 3rd of the season and get Blues back on track.

Southend were looking for a dominant performance at Roots Hall and supporters were treated to an early goal. Midfielder Josh Simpson made a good burst down the right and after playing a neat one-two with Clohessy he delivered a great ball to the near post that Sturrock converted well with his chest.

Rotherham looked to respond but the Blues backline stayed strong throughout the half. It was Southend that nearly added to the score though but Blair Sturrock saw his 20-yard shot drift wide of the goal.

Timlin and Grant then exchanged passes but Anthony Grant's effort flew over the bar and out of the ground. Glenn Morris then saved well form a Kevin Ellison volley but it really should have been two-nil to Southend just before the break.

Blair Sturrock controlled and turned well but saw his shot deflect up and onto the bar, and Barry Corr dragged the rebound wide. This was better from Southend though, more dominant at home, which is what we have been wanting to see.

The second half started in the same manner as Southend were on the front foot. Striker Barry Corr was the first to go close when he saw his brave header go inches wide of the post.

Returning centre-back Bilel Mohsni then also nodded inches wide after good play from Peter Gilbert. Despite dominating the game I felt we needed a second goal but we just couldn't seem to get it.

Barry Corr saw another header go wide and Ryan Hall's lashed volley went harmlessly wide of Andy Warrington's goal. Warrington then made a great save to deny Corr the goal he deserved.

Ground Review:

Moss Rose is a typical League Two/Conference level type ground. The open terrace for away supporters behind one of the goals and behind the other goal was another terrace, but this was covered.

The stand to our left was covered and just one tiered and away supporters could go in there if they wanted to. To the left was the main stand, which was very old fashioned.

With a very low gate, it was hard to tell whether the acoustics where any good, but these structures normally are.

Two substitutes combined to make sure Southend United were in the hat for the second round draw, even if they could only manage a draw, despite being the better side by a country mile. Ryan Hall crossed for Barry Corr to superbly convert for his 6th of the season and that cancelled out Brown's goal just after half-time. The Shrimpers Trust coach arrived just in time to see Antonio German's penalty after a fatal accident on the M6.

I cannot report on the first 25 minutes of the game after not being in attendance after the fatal accident on the M6 but the coach groaned when we found out we were 1-0 down, fortunately by the sounds of things, Blues were outplayed for the first 20 minutes, so what we saw was really pleasing.

The first action we witnessed was to see French-Algerian Sofiene Zaaboub get chopped down in the box and the ref awarded a penalty to us. Up stepped highly rated QPR loanee Antonio German and he superbly dispatched the penalty, left footed, into the top corner of the net.

After the goal it was all Southend, but did not really force any chances on goal. We won a few corners in succession and a dragged shot from midfield just went wide, but we looked comfortable.

However, 2 minutes into the second half, Macclesfield were back in front. A free-kick to the back stick was missed by Mohsni and Clohessy and Brown had the simplest of tasks to nod across goal and past Morris into the far corner.

That seemed to wake Southend up again and from that moment we clearly dominated the game. However, it wasn't until the introduction of Ryan Hall that we looked likely to score and we did within 10 minutes of his introduction.

He beat his man for skill and pace, before placing a peach of a ball into the penalty area for Barry Corr to power home his 6th of the season and see Blues go into a replay at Roots Hall Tuesday week, where the winner will be away at either Cambridge United or Huddersfield Town, who tied 0-0 in their first round match.

A wonderful solo effort from Thierry Racon sealed a victory for Charlton in a closely matched area quarter-final tie. The Frenchman hit a dipping left footed strike past Rhys Evans to end Southend United's dream of reaching the final at Wembley.

After a good performance and a fairly good result against Macclesfield in the FA Cup on Saturday we returned to home soil to try and get closer to the final at Wembley Stadium.

Charlton named former Blues duo Simon Francis and Alan McCormack in their starting line up and that signaled the intent of Phil Parkinson's side in this fixture. The game started brightly for Southend as they looked to attack when possible and they had a few sights on goal through Blair Sturrock, but the strikers' shots were comfortable for Rob Elliot.

Charlton started to dictate play after that and they looked dangerous on the attack with Pawell Abbott and Lee Martin looking the most likely to score, but they did not threaten Evans in the Blues goal.

However, on the 28th minute a moment of magic from a quality player. Racon picked up the ball after Blues failed to clear their lines and the Frenchman cut in from the right to hit a sweet shot into the far corner past Evans.
