As I write this, the morning after losing to the bottom team, even my younger son's hopes are extinguished. FOOTBALL GOVERNANCE

Parliamentary inquiry may demand clubs get licences and involve fans..... David Conn – guardian.co.uk

The parliamentary committee inquiring into the running of football is considering whether a licensing system could be introduced for English professional clubs similar to the ones operated in Germany and by Uefa. Clubs would need a licence, probably under the auspices of the Football Association, to compete in the Premier League, Football League and Conference. Licences would be granted if clubs fulfil a range of criteria, which could include being financially responsible, transparent about their ownership and involving supporters in their decision-making.

Dave Boyle, the chief executive of Supporters Direct, was asked by Damian Collins, a Conservative member of the House of Commons culture, media and sport committee, sitting at Burnley Football Club, whether he believed a licensing system should be introduced. Boyle argued it should. He pointed to Germany, where since the Bundesliga was formed in 1963 no club has fallen insolvent, whereas here, since the Premier League broke away from the Football League in 1992, there have been 55 club insolvencies.

The committee has visited Germany where, according to the Labour MP Paul Farrelly: "There was more of a collective ethos than is evident here."

Collins challenged <u>Leeds United's</u> chief executive, Shaun Harvey, about the club's ownership, which is mostly held by the Forward Sports Fund, registered in Nevis, West Indies, owned by three offshore trusts administered in Switzerland. Harvey told the committee he did not know who the owners of those trusts are. Asked by Collins whether the Leeds chairman, Ken Bates, knows who the offshore trusts' owners are, Harvey replied: "Not to my knowledge."

Collins suggested that anonymous ownership gave rise to "a legitimate concern over transparency". Harvey replied: "You are entitled to your own conclusion."



He explained that Leeds have complied with Football League rules, which require clubs to name publicly all individuals owning more than 10% of the shares. Leeds have said none of the trusts' beneficiaries hold more than 10%, so have not named any individuals. That answer, Harvey said, was: "True and accurate."

John Whittingdale, the Conservative chairman of the committee, intervened, saying: "It is true, accurate – and rather uninformative."

The committee is examining whether to recommend reforms to football's governing bodies and rules in England and Wales, and how to "enhance supporter involvement in decision-making". The inquiry follows the coalition government's pledge to "support the co-operative ownership of football clubs by supporters". Farrelly said the government had asked the committee to work out how this could be done.

Barry Kilby, the Burnley chairman, giving evidence, said the club's directors are Burnley supporters, who have paid considerable money to own shares, and he could not see a supporters'

representative joining the board without having bought a stake. John Bowler, the Crewe Alexandra chairman, said: "A number of us have concerns about foreign ownership of clubs", and he is actively trying to encourage a supporters' trust to buy 25% of the shares and elect a director to the board. Bowler believed that would further embed the club in the community.

Malcolm Clarke, chairman of the Football Supporters' Federation, said fans have "a wide range of skills" and could contribute greatly to their clubs. A member of the FA council, he argued the FA needs to be reformed because the council, a body of 118 representatives, has no real power and is bypassed by the FA board.



Southend United got their play-off hunt back on track after coming from behind to beat high flying Wycombe at Roots Hall. Pittman put the visitors in front before Barry Corr powered in a header from 8 yards before he was joined on the score sheet by youngster Kane Ferdinand. Southend missed the chance to go two goals ahead when Sturrock saw his penalty saved and Wycombe nearly snatched a point when Rendell tucked home his spot kick in the last minute. However, Captain Craig Easton was on hand to fire home a stunning strike seconds after the restart.

After the cancellation at the weekend Blues were back in action at a wet Roots Hall. Tonight's visitors were high flying Wycombe Wanderers who were sitting 3rd in the league table. Former Blues winger Kevin Betsy was named on the bench.

Southend started slowly and Wycombe were by far the better side but neither side mustered up any chances on goal. That was until the 31st minute when Pittman played a neat one two with Rendell and the striker coolly dispatched the ball past Evans.

The second half was much better from Southend with the halftime team-talk working wonders. Within 5 minutes of the restart Blues were level. Barry Corr powered Ryan Hall's telling corner home for his 13th goal of the season. That was soon followed by a first goal in senior football for Kane Ferdinand. The youngster, recently capped for his country, guided his effort into the bottom corner from another fine Hall cross.

Blair Sturrock then saw his penalty well saved by the goalkeeper before Easton conceded a penalty for a harsh handball. Rendell tucked it away nicely as it looked for the entire world Wycombe would nick a point only until Easton controlled and hit a volley all in one movement to secure another impressive victory.

Barry Corr's 14th goal of the season ten minutes from time earned Southend United a deserved draw away at Torquay. Billy Kee had fired the hosts in front from close range but Corr was on hand to power home a strike from a tight angle and snatch a point for the Blues.

Paul Sturrock had to make one change to the starting line up against Wycombe as Mark Phillips was missing through injury so the fit-again Coughlan came into the back four to partner Barker at centre-back.

The pitch was very poor and the ball bobbled about all over the place so it was hard for either time to get their passing game going. Sights on goal were few and far between as neither side were able to muster up a real decent effort to test the opposition keepers.

Southend started the brighter of the two sides after the break and after losing Anthony Grant to a head injury the introduction of Lee Sawyer swung the game into our favour.

However, it was against the run of play when the hosts took the lead, pace and power from Zebroski got him away from Coughlan and the ball to Kee was inch perfect which made the ex-Leicester strikers chance much easier as he tucked it into the bottom corner of the goal.

Blues were not out of this by a long stretch and had shouts for a penalty turned down when Clohessy was tripped in the box. Guy Brantson nearly sliced a Sawyer cross into his own net before Barry Corr got the better of the veteran centre-back to slam the ball home.

Good play from Easton and Hall in the build up lead to Corr getting away from his man at the far post. The Irish striker got a clean connection on the ball and it flew into the top corner of the goal.

During the last five minutes of play both teams could have won the match and Blues' best chance fell to young striker Kyle Asante who raced onto a superb pass from Sawyer only the fire into the side netting.

Southend United moved to within one point of the play-off places after beating Barnet at Roots Hall. Two early strikes sealed the win one from Craig Easton and the other a beautiful curled finish from Ryan Hall. Blair Sturrock set up both goals to push Southend up to 9th in the league, a point off the play offs with a game in hand.

After a decent point away from home at Torquay on Saturday, Southend were back in action at home, against Barnet. Even though they are at the foot of the table they were unbeaten in their last six games away from home.

With injuries to Grant and Ferdinand plus fitness doubts over Barry Corr Sturrock made a few changes to his side. Comminges, Sawyer and Soares came into the side, all having a point to prove.

In the first 20-25 minutes of the game Blues were unplayable. Knocking the ball around with class and ease and almost went ahead when Blair Sturrock's great header was pushed out by Cole only to see Ryan Hall miss the rebound.

It wasn't long before we took the lead and it came through captain fantastic, Craig Easton. A free-flowing move ended with Sturrock cutting the ball back across goal for Easton to tap home from close range. Just five minutes later and Blues doubled their lead. Evans' long ball forward to superbly flicked on by Sturrock into the path of Hall who danced around the Barnet defence before slipping a delightful finish into the far corner of the goal.

Despite being in control Southend took their foot off the gas and Barnet got a consolation 2 minutes from time when Kabba headed home unmarked. Blues now move closer to the play-off spots, just one point away.

Saturday 26th February 2011

Southend United moved up to 8th position in League Two after coming from behind to secure a draw against Northampton Town at Roots Hall. Barry Corr powered home his 15th goal of the season after Johnson had put the visitors ahead. Blues are now just one point and one place shy of the play-offs with a game in hand over Gillingham, who they face next Tuesday.

Influential midfielder Anthony Grant and top goal scorer Barry Corr returned to the starting line-up as Blues hosted draw specialists Northampton at Roots Hall. After a win on Tuesday night against Barnet, Southend were closing in on the play-offs, and anything but a defeat would move Blues up a position in the league.

On a very heavy pitch, unusual for Southend, the game took a little while to get going. The Shrimpers were much the better side but neither team got an effort on goal that troubled either keeper.

Against the run of play The Cobblers took the lead through Johnson. Lee Sawyer gave the ball away in midfield which allowed Johnson time and space to unleash a swerving low drive that moved away from Evans in the Blues goal.

Just 8 minutes later Southend were level. After a decent move Peter Gilbert had a powerful shot on target which the goalkeeper turned around the post for a corner. Ryan Hall's delivery was met by a bullet header from Corr to deservedly put Blues level.

Anthony Grant and Ryan Hall both went close towards the end of the first half for Southend but neither effort troubled the keeper. Northampton looked content for a point and they sat back for most of the second half.

In all honesty the second half petered out to a non-event with very little action from both sides. The leggy Blues nearly saw all three points taken away from them when Francis Laurent flashed a shot just wide of the post.



Southend United and Gillingham played out a great game of football at Roots Hall stadium on Tuesday night and the result left both teams still in with a shout of promotion from League Two. Ryan Hall scored two fantastic goals during a sensational performance and after the week he has endured you have to give him credit.

Tonight's game was between two teams gunning for promotion and with five points the gap between the two sides anything but a defeat would have been a positive result for Southend. Lee Sawyer returned to the starting line up in place of Louie Soares and Ryan Hall kept his place in the side despite his on going personal problems.

The game started quick and fiery and it was the Gills that put the ball in the back of the net first. A loose ball from the Southend midfield invited Gillingham to attack and they just carved through the Blues backline releasing former Witham and Maldon striker Cody McDonald to fire low past Rhys Evans.

The Shrimpers responded and within 10 minutes they were back on level terms. Blair Sturrock won a free-kick on the edge of the box which was taken by Ryan Hall. The winger took the free-kick and fired it past the goalkeeper with immaculate placement and power.

The lead was short lived as Gillingham re-took the lead through Akinfenwa who very nearly joined Southend in the summer. The decision was a dubious one as the linesman flagged for a foul when it seemed a very soft tackle and it was also outside the box. Akinfenwa stepped up and took the penalty that nestled into the bottom corner of the South Stand goal.
